**STAR-SPANGLED BANNER** ......F.S. Key and J.S. Smith

O Music .....Lowell Mason, arr. Doreen Rao

This piece's composer, a prominent music educator, is credited with introducing music into American public schools. He wrote over 1,600 hymns and encouraged churches to use congregation singing instead of professional choirs.

O BELLA FUSA...... Orlando di Lasso, arr. Sherri Porterfield, English text by Sherri Porterfield

Orlando di Lasso (1532–1594) was one of the most prolific Renaissance composers, with over 2,000 compositions in Latin, French, Italian, and German. This Italian piece about a beautiful spinning wheel is a madrigal, which is a type of secular vocal song without accompaniment.

SCARBOROUGH FAIR ..... English Folk Ballad, arr. Mary Goetze

This traditional English ballad has evolved over hundreds of years, but was popularized by Simon & Garfunkel in the 1960s. The actual Scarborough Fair was a fair in Yorkshire created by a royal charter from King Henry III in 1253.

**DIAMONDS ARE A GIRL'S BEST FRIEND.....** Words by Leo Robin, Music by Jule Styne, arr. Mark Hayes

First sung by Carol Channing in the 1949 Broadway production of *Gentlemen Prefer Blondes*, this song was further popularized by Marilyn Monroe's performance in the film adaptation. The American Film Institute ranked it 12th on their 2004 list of the top 100 songs in American cinema.

THE ROAD NOT TAKEN ...... Robert Frost, Randall Thompson

For the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the town of Amherst, Massachusetts in 1959, the town commissioned composer Randall Thompson (1899–1984) to write *Frostiana*, a setting of seven poems by Robert Frost, who had lived in Amherst. This is the first song, using Frost's popular 1916 poem.

JAVA JIVE..... Milton Drake and Ben Oakland, arr. Kirby Shaw

This 1940 song, which hit number 15 on the Billboard charts, is filled with slang from that era. "Mr. Moto" in the song is a reference to a Japanese detective played by Peter Lorre in eight 1930s films, while "cutting a rug" refers to dancing.

## PUT A LITTLE LOVE IN YOUR HEART ...... arr. Greg Gilpin

Another popular Billboard hit, this song reached number 4 in 1969, sung by Jackie DeShannon. This arrangement combines that hit with 1972's "Love Train," sung by The O'Jays, creating a medley about the power of love.

## **Band**

THE WASHINGTON GRAYS......Claudio Grafulla, arr. G.H. Reeves

Claudio Grafulla (1812–1880) was a noted march composer whose music was popular with regimental bands during the American Civil War. This piece was written for the 8<sup>th</sup> Regiment, New York State Militia, whose name came from their gray uniforms and role as George Washington's escort at his first presidential inauguration.

THE IMMOVABLE DO ......Percy Grainger

The title's "Do" refers to the tonic, or base note, of solfège, a music education method used to teach pitch and sight-reading. Percy Grainger (1882–1962) was inspired while playing organ when a note became stuck and continued to drone, so he improvised a composition around the unchanging note.

Tales of the Moon....... Kyo Sook Lee, arr. Robert Oldroyd

This piece was written by noted Korean composer and conductor Kyo-Sook Lee (1924–2017), who taught at multiple universities and helped introduce harp and jazz music to Korea. Robert Oldroyd arranged the piece for wind band after discovering it in the papers of Cornell University and Ithaca College professor Karel Husa.

AIR FOR BAND.....Frank Erickson

Frank Erickson (1923–1996) arranged music for army bands while serving with the U.S. Army Air Forces in World War II, later becoming a San Jose University professor. He wrote "Air for Band" to expand repertoire for younger musicians that was not too technically difficult but still melodically interesting and educational.

**PETER AND THE WOLF** ......Sergei Prokofiev, arr. Jim Curnow Narrated by Jean Wittman

Russian composer Sergei Prokofiev (1891–1953) was asked to write a piece in order to introduce orchestra instruments to children. In this song and corresponding story, each character is represented by a different instrument or sound. As you listen, try to identify the characters in the music.

## **Participants**

The 2019 band and chorus participants range in age from 8 to 84, include at least 24 family groups (some with three generations!), and represent 18 area communities: Cortland, DeRuyter, Dryden, East Freetown, Etna, Freeville, Greene, Groton, Harford, Homer, Horseheads, Ithaca, Marathon, McLean, Moravia, Newfield, Spencer, and Virgil.
